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**The Commonwealth of Massachusetts**

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Fifty-Nine.

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AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE LOWELL TECHNOLOGICAL INSTITUTE OF MASSACHUSETTS TO MAINTAIN A SATELLITE-MISSILE DEPARTMENT.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 75A of the General Laws is hereby  
2 amended by inserting after section 23 the following section:—  
3 *Section 23A. Satellite-Missile Department.*— The Institute  
4 may establish and manage, under such regulations as the board  
5 of trustees may from time to time prescribe, a satellite-missile  
6 department for the purpose of instruction, development and  
7 encouragement in satellite-missile research. The department  
8 shall consult and co-operate with the Massachusetts Institute  
9 of Technology, other states and the United States on such  
10 matters.

1 SECTION 2. For the purposes of this act the department may  
2 expend such sums as may be appropriated therefor, not to exceed  
3 two million dollars.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

As amended by the Thirteenth, Fourteenth, and Fifteenth Amendments

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES, as amended, is hereby published in accordance with the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved July 10, 1874, and the Act of Congress, approved July 10, 1875.

It is the duty of every citizen to know the Constitution of his country, and to be prepared to defend it against all enemies, foreign and domestic.

1. The Constitution of the United States is the supreme law of the land, and no State shall make any law which shall infringe the Constitution.

2. The Congress shall have the power to lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises, to regulate commerce with foreign nations, to borrow money on the credit of the United States, to define and punish the crimes against the United States, to declare war, to grant letters of marque and reprisal, to make rules concerning captures on land and water, to organize an Army, to organize a Navy, to fix the standard of weights and measures, to provide for calling forth the Militia to execute the laws of the Union, to suppress insurrections and to repel invasions, to provide and organize a system of land and naval forces, to regulate the Militia, to provide for the organization, armament and discipline of the Militia, to provide for the organization, armament and discipline of the Militia, to provide for the organization, armament and discipline of the Militia.
