AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE DEVELOPMENT OF A POLICY FOR DEALING WITH STUDENTS WHO ARE UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF INTOXICATING LIQUOR OR CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter 71 of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting
2 after section 59B the following section: —

3 Section 59C. Whenever it appears to any public school teacher
4 that a student may be under the influence of any intoxicating
5 beverages or a controlled dangerous substance, as defined in
6 chapter ninety-four C, that teacher shall report the matter, upon
7 recognition, to the school principal who shall immediately notify
8 the superintendent of schools and a parent or legal guardian of
9 the student of the matter.

10 Every school district shall have and deliver to each classroom
11 teacher a written policy that such teachers shall follow if they have
12 a student who appears to be under the influence of intoxicating
13 beverages, or a controlled substance in their classroom. The
14 written policy shall be developed by the superintendent of schools
15 and adopted by the school committee. The written policy shall
16 be filed with the office of the commissioner of education.

It is the duty of the State to provide for the education of its children, and to see that the schools are properly maintained and that the teachers are properly trained and paid.

The Constitution of the State
