AN ACT

Making appropriations for Sundry Charitable Expenses.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The sums hereinafter mentioned
2 are appropriated to be paid out of the treasury
3 of the Commonwealth, from the ordinary reve-
4 nue, for the purposes specified, to meet sundry
5 charitable expenses, for the year ending on the
6 thirty-first day of December in the year eighteen
7 hundred and ninety, to wit: —

STATE BOARD OF LUNACY AND CHARITY.

8 For expenses of the board including travelling
9 and other expenses of the members, necessary
10 legal expenses, and salary and expenses of the
11 clerk and auditor, a sum not exceeding forty-five
12 hundred dollars. [Pub. Stat., chap. 79.]

13 For salaries and expenses in the department of
14 in-door poor, a sum not exceeding thirty-three
15 thousand five hundred dollars. [Pub. Stat., chap.
16 79; Acts 1884, chap. 258.]

17 For salaries and expenses in the department of
18 out-door poor, a sum not exceeding nineteen thou-
19 sand nine hundred dollars. [Pub. Stat. chap. 79.]

20 For salaries and expenses in the department of
21 the inspector of institutions, a sum not exceeding
22 ten thousand five hundred dollars. [Pub. Stat.,
23 chap. 79.]

24 For travelling and other necessary expenses of
25 the auxiliary visitors of the state board of lunacy
26 and charity, a sum not exceeding fifteen hundred
27 dollars. [Pub. Stat., chap. 79.]

MISCELLANEOUS CHARITABLE.

28 For the transportation of state paupers, a sum
29 not exceeding sixteen thousand dollars. [Pub.
30 Stat., chap. 79, sect. 14; chap. 86, sect. 38; chap.
31 87, sects. 37 and 38; Acts 1887, chap. 367.]

32 For transportation of state paupers to the state
33 almshouse, a sum not exceeding seven hundred
34 dollars. [Pub. Stat., chap. 86, sect. 22.]

35 For the support and relief of state paupers in
36 state lunatic hospitals and asylums of the Com-
37 monwealth, and of state lunatic paupers boarded
38 out in families, a sum not exceeding one hundred
39 and forty-eight thousand dollars. [Pub. Stat.,
40 chap. 79; chap. 87, sects. 31, 32 and 45; Acts
41 1885, chap. 385.]

42 For expenses attending the management of

43 cases of settlement and bastardy, a sum not ex-
44 ceeding one thousand five hundred dollars. [Pub.
45 Stat., chap. 85, sect. 2; chap. 86, sect. 35; chap.
46 87, sect. 32.]

47 For the care and maintenance of indigent and
48 neglected children and juvenile offenders, a sum
49 not exceeding sixteen thousand dollars. [Pub.
50 Stat., chap. 89, sect. 22; Acts 1882, chap. 181,
51 sects. 2 and 3.]

52 For the support of state paupers in the Massa-
53 chusetts school for the feeble-minded, and the
54 hospital cottages for children at Baldwinsville, a
55 sum not exceeding six thousand dollars. [Acts
56 1886, chap. 298; 1889, chap. 230.]

57 For the support of sick state paupers by cities
58 and towns, a sum not exceeding fifty thousand
59 dollars, which is hereby made applicable for the
60 payment of claims for the present and previous
61 years. [Pub. Stat., chap. 86, sect. 26.]

62 For the burial of state paupers, a sum not
63 exceeding seven thousand dollars. [Pub. Stat.
64 chap. 84, sect. 17; Acts 1887, chap. 310.]

65 For temporary and for state paupers and ship-
66 wrecked seamen, by cities and towns for the
67 present and previous years, a sum not exceeding
68 sixteen thousand dollars. [Pub. Stat., chap. 84,
69 sect. 18; Acts 1886, chap. 179.]

70 For the support and transportation of pauper
71 infants having no known settlement in this
72 Commonwealth, to include infants in the infant
73 asylums, a sum not exceeding fifteen thousand

74 dollars. [Pub. Stat., chap. 86, sects. 44, 46 and
75 47; Acts 1882, chap. 181; 1883, chap. 232.]

76 For expenses incurred in connection with
77 small pox and other diseases dangerous to the
78 public health, a sum not exceeding three thous-
79 and dollars, which is hereby made applicable
80 for the payment of claims for the present and
81 previous years. [Pub. Stat., chap. 80, sect. 83;
82 chap. 86, sect. 25.]

83 For expenses incurred in connection with
84 medical examinations and inquests, a sum not
85 exceeding thirty-five hundred dollars. [Pub.
86 Stat., chap. 26; Acts 1887, chap. 310.]

87 For annuities due from the Commonwealth,
88 incurred by the acceptance of the bequest of the
89 late Martha Johonnot, a sum not exceeding six
90 hundred dollars. [Res. 1841, chap. 65; 1843,
91 chap. 73.]

92 For annuities to soldiers and others authorized
93 by the legislature, a sum not exceeding thirty-
94 four hundred and six dollars. [Res. 1874, chap.
95 83; 1876, chap. 14; 1879, chaps. 14, 23 and 49;
96 1885, chaps. 41 and 44; 1886, chaps. 6, 21 and
97 28; 1887, chaps. 11, 12, 13, 34, 54, 83 and 89;
98 1888, chaps. 10, 21, 27 and 53; 1889, chaps. 39,
99 46 and 52.]

100 For pensions, a sum not exceeding five hun-
101 dred and twenty dollars. [Res. 1869, chap. 83;
102 1870, chap. 64; 1873, chap. 63.]

1 SECT. 2. This act shall take effect upon its
2 passage.
