In the Year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Ninety.

AN ACT

Making Appropriations for Salaries and Expenses at the State Prison, Massachusetts Reformatory, the Reformatory Prison for Women, and for Expenses in Connection therewith.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The sums hereinafter mentioned
2 are appropriated, to be paid out of the treasury
3 of the Commonwealth, from the ordinary revenue,
4 for the purposes specified, to meet expenses for
5 the year ending on the thirty-first day of Decem-
6 ber, in the year eighteen hundred and ninety, to
7 wit:—

8 For the payment of salaries and wages at the
9 state prison at Boston, a sum not exceeding sixty-
10 three thousand dollars; and for other current
11 expenses at said institution, a sum not exceed-
12 ing seventy-four thousand five hundred dollars.

14 For the payment of salaries and wages at the
15 Massachusetts reformatory at Concord, a sum not
16 exceeding sixty-nine thousand dollars; and for
17 other current expenses at said institution, a sum
18 not exceeding ninety-six thousand dollars. [Acts
19 1884, chap. 255; 1889, chap. 403.]

20 For the payment of salaries and wages at the
21 reformatory prison for women at Sherborn, a
22 sum not exceeding twenty-four thousand dollars;
23 and for other current expenses at said institution,
24 a sum not exceeding thirty-two thousand dollars.
25 [Pub. Stat., chap. 221; Acts 1884, chap. 43;
26 1887, chap. 341; 1888, chap. 327.]

27 For expenses incurred in removing prisoners
28 to and from the reformatory prison for women, a
29 sum not exceeding two hundred dollars. [Pub.
30 Stat., chap. 219.]

31 For expenses incurred in removing prisoners
32 to and from the Massachusetts reformatory, a
33 sum not exceeding six hundred dollars. [Acts
34 1884, chap. 255.]

35 For supporting prisoners removed from the
36 reformatory prison for women, a sum not exceed-
37 ing two hundred dollars. [Pub. Stat., chap. 219,
38 sect. 12.]

39 For supporting prisoners removed from the
40 Massachusetts reformatory, a sum not exceeding
41 two hundred dollars. [Acts 1884, chap. 255.]

42 For the salary of the agent for aiding convicts
43 discharged from the state prison, one thousand
44 dollars; and for expenses of said agent, a sum
45 not exceeding three thousand dollars, to be used

46 in rendering assistance to said convicts. [Pub.
47 Stat., chap. 219, sect. 26.]

48 For expenses of the agent for aiding dis-
49 charged female convicts discharged from the
50 prisons of the Commonwealth, to include assist-
51 ance rendered to said convicts, a sum not exceed-
52 ing three thousand dollars. [Acts 1888, chap.
53 417.]

54 For aiding prisoners discharged from the
55 Massachusetts reformatory, a sum not exceeding
56 five thousand dollars. [Acts 1884, chap. 255;
57 1887, chap. 395.]

58 For incidental and contingent expenses of the
59 commissioners of prisons, a sum not exceeding
60 twelve hundred dollars. [Pub. Stat. chap. 219.]

61 For travelling expenses of the commissioners
62 of prisons, of the secretary and agents of said
63 commissioners, a sum not exceeding twenty-five
64 hundred dollars. [Pub. Stat., chap. 219; Acts
65 1887, chap. 315.]

66 For the support of Sarah J. Robinson, a pris-
67 oner in jail at Lowell in the county of Middlesex,
68 a sum not exceeding four hundred dollars. [Res.
69 1889, chap. 79.]

70 For expenses incurred in the arrest of fugitives
71 from justice, a sum not exceeding two thousand
72 dollars. [Pub. Stat., chap. 218.]

1 SECT. 2. This act shall take effect upon its
2 passage.
