

Chap. 232. AN ACT DESIGNATING THE BRIDGE OVER THE MASSACHUSETTS TURNPIKE AT WASHINGTON AND CHURCH STREETS IN THE CITY OF NEWTON AS THE PRIVATE FIRST CLASS W. WALLACE RICHARD BRIDGE.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

SECTION 1. The bridge over the Massachusetts Turnpike at Washington and Church streets in the Newtonville district of the city of Newton shall be known and designated as the Private First Class W. Wallace Richard bridge, in memory of W. Wallace Richard who as a member of the armed forces of the United States was the first resident of Newton to be killed in the Vietnam campaign, and a suitable marker bearing said designation attached thereto by the Massachusetts Turnpike Authority, provided that the cost of said marker is paid for by the family of said Private First Class W. Wallace Richard.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its acceptance by the Massachusetts Turnpike Authority. *Approved May 5, 1967.*

Chap. 233. AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE ELECTION OF NOT MORE THAN TWO DIRECTORS OF A TRUST COMPANY BY A MAJORITY VOTE OF ITS DIRECTORS.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

The first paragraph of section 13 of chapter 172 of the General Laws, as appearing in section 1 of chapter 493 of the acts of 1961, is hereby amended by striking out the third sentence and inserting in place thereof the following sentence: — The directors shall be elected, in such manner as is provided in the by-laws, by the stockholders at their annual meeting or at a special meeting called for the purpose; provided, however, that if the by-laws so prescribe, a number of directors, not exceeding two, may be elected by vote of a majority of the directors then in office. *Approved May 5, 1967.*

Chap. 234. AN ACT TO PERMIT CERTAIN OFFICIALS TO DELAY KILLING CERTAIN UNMUZZLED OR UNRESTRAINED DOGS.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

Section 167 of chapter 140 of the General Laws, as appearing in the Tercentenary Edition, is hereby amended by adding the following three sentences: — Notwithstanding the foregoing, a police officer or constable may, in his discretion, hold any such dog for a period not in excess of ten days. If the owner thereof claims such dog and pays to such officer or constable the sum of five dollars, together with one dollar and fifty cents for each day that it is so held, it shall be returned to the owner. The fee of five dollars shall be paid over to the city or town and the remaining moneys shall be retained by such officer or constable as his fee. *Approved May 5, 1967.*
