

feat its purpose, which is, in part, to allow additional time to inform the public of increased and severe penalties for the illegal carrying of firearms, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public convenience.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

SECTION 1. The operation of chapter six hundred and forty-nine of the acts of nineteen hundred and seventy-four shall be suspended until April first, nineteen hundred and seventy-five.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect as of December thirty-first, nineteen hundred and seventy-four.

Chap. 5. AN ACT MAKING A CORRECTIVE CHANGE IN THE LAW RELATIVE TO THE NUMBER OF ASSISTANT DISTRICT ATTORNEYS IN THE BRISTOL DISTRICT.

Whereas, The deferred operation of this act would tend to defeat its purpose, which is to authorize the district attorney of the Bristol district to appoint three additional assistant district attorneys pursuant to salaries established therefor under the provisions of chapter eight hundred and nine of the acts of nineteen hundred and seventy-four, therefore it is hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the immediate preservation of the public safety and convenience.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

Section 14 of chapter 12 of the General Laws is hereby amended by striking out the eighth paragraph, as appearing in section 2 of chapter 744 of the acts of, 1972, and inserting in place thereof the following paragraph: —

For the Bristol district, seven assistant district attorneys.

Chap. 6. AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE TOWN OF METHUEN TO APPROPRIATE AND PAY A CERTAIN SUM OF MONEY TO CARL REUTER.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

SECTION 1. The town of Methuen is hereby authorized to appropriate a sum of money, not to exceed five hundred and twenty-seven dollars and thirty-one cents, and after such appropriation, the treasurer of said town is authorized to pay to Carl Reuter, a retired firefighter of said town, the amount which he was entitled to as vacation pay for the year nineteen hundred and seventy-one, and payment for which is legally unenforceable against said town.

SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

Chap. 7. AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE TOWN OF PAXTON TO CONSTRUCT AND MAINTAIN A STANDPIPE AND CONNECTION THERETO ON LAND IN SAID TOWN UNDER THE JURISDICTION OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

SECTION 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of any law or regulation to the contrary, the town of Paxton is hereby authorized to construct and maintain a standpipe and the connection therefrom to the water system of said town on the following two parcels of land under the jurisdiction of the conservation commission of said town:

Parcel 1. Beginning at a point at the most southeasterly corner of the Parcel to be described; said point being northwesterly and seventy-six (76) feet more or less from a stone bound at the northwesterly corner of land now owned by Paul E. and Eileen V. Flynn, as recorded in Worcester District Registry of Deeds Plan Book 5041, Page 443;

THENCE northwesterly along land now or formerly of Graham, a distance of one hundred (100) feet to a point;

THENCE southwesterly, by a line perpendicular to the first course, a distance of one hundred (100) feet to a point;

THENCE southeasterly, by a line parallel to and one hundred (100) feet from the first course, a distance of one hundred (100) feet to a point;

THENCE northeasterly, by a line parallel to and one hundred (100) feet from the second course, a distance of one hundred (100) feet to the point of beginning.

Said Parcel contains ten thousand (10,000) square feet.

Parcel 2. Beginning at a point at the most southeasterly corner of Lot 3, Section K on "Plans of Lots in Paxton, Massachusetts" recorded in the Worcester District Registry of Deeds Plan Book 216, Page 9;

THENCE northerly along Lot 3 of said plan, a distance of twenty (20) feet to a point;

THENCE easterly, a distance of sixty-two (62) feet more or less to a point;

THENCE northeasterly, a distance of one hundred ten (110) feet more or less to a point;

THENCE easterly, a distance of four hundred eighteen (418) feet more or less to a point;

THENCE southerly, a distance of twenty (20) feet to a point;

THENCE westerly, a distance of four hundred ten (410) feet more or less to a point;
