

the board of directors of the Massachusetts Chiefs of Police Association, Inc., and one of whom shall be a member of the Massachusetts Police Association, who shall be selected from two nominees submitted by the board of directors of said association. *Approved July 25, 1967.*

Chap. 469. AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE STATE TREASURER TO INVEST CERTAIN FUNDS OF THE GROUP INSURANCE COMMISSION TRUST FUND IN BANK STOCKS.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

Section 9A of chapter 32A of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after the seventh sentence, as appearing in chapter 625 of the acts of 1963, the following sentence: — Not more than twenty-five per cent of the total funds of the trust fund shall be invested in bank stocks nor shall more than one half of said twenty-five per cent be invested in the stock of any one bank. *Approved July 25, 1967.*

Chap. 470. AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE TRUSTEES OF CLARK UNIVERSITY TO HOLD ADDITIONAL PROPERTY.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

The Trustees of Clark University, incorporated by chapter one hundred and thirty-three of the acts of eighteen hundred and eighty-seven, may hold, for the purposes of its incorporation, property to an amount not exceeding fifty million dollars. *Approved July 25, 1967.*

Chap. 471. AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE NEW ENGLAND SANITARIUM AND BENEVOLENT ASSOCIATION TO HOLD ADDITIONAL REAL AND PERSONAL ESTATE.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

New England Sanitarium and Benevolent Association, a corporation duly organized and existing under the provisions of general law, is hereby authorized to hold real and personal property to an amount not exceeding fifteen million dollars. *Approved July 25, 1967.*

Chap. 472. AN ACT ESTABLISHING CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICTS.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 57 of the General Laws is hereby amended by striking out section 1, as most recently amended by chapter 315 of the acts of 1962, and inserting in place thereof the following section: —

Section 1. For the purpose of electing representatives in the Congress of the United States, until otherwise provided by law, the commonwealth is divided into the following twelve districts, each of which shall elect one representative:

Number One, — Consisting of the cities and towns in Berkshire county; the towns in Franklin county; the cities of Holyoke and Westfield and the towns of Agawam, Blandford, Chester, Granville, Montgomery, Russell, Southwick, Tolland and West Springfield, all in Hampden county; the city of Northampton and the towns of Amherst,
