
By Mr. Matera of Boston, petition of Francis V. Matera that the Metropolitan District Commission be authorized to acquire certain property in the East Boston district of Boston and to develop the same for park and beach purposes. Metropolitan Affairs.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Forty-Six.

AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE ACQUISITION BY THE METROPOLITAN DISTRICT COMMISSION OF CERTAIN PROPERTY IN THE EAST BOSTON DISTRICT OF THE CITY OF BOSTON, AND THE DEVELOPMENT AND MAINTENANCE OF SAID PROPERTY FOR PARK, BEACH AND OTHER RECREATIONAL PURPOSES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 The metropolitan district commission is hereby
2 authorized and directed, on behalf of the common-
3 wealth, to take by eminent domain under chapter
4 seventy-nine of the General Laws, or acquire by
5 purchase or otherwise, lands or rights in lands in the
6 East Boston district of the city of Boston along the
7 proposed northerly line of the General Logan airport
8 and the southerly shore line of said district, extending
9 from Maverick street in said district to the Orient
10 Heights section thereof, and to develop, improve and
11 maintain the property so acquired for park, beach and
12 other recreational purposes. For the purpose of
13 carrying out the provisions of this act said commission
14 may expend such sums, not exceeding
15 dollars, as may hereafter be appropriated therefor.

The Constitution of the United States

Article I. Section 1.

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch in that State.

Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be admitted into or excluded from this Union according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole Number of free Persons, (excluding Indians not taxed) three fifths of all other Persons. The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress, and within the Interval of equal Numbers there shall be made.

Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be admitted into or excluded from this Union according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole Number of free Persons, (excluding Indians not taxed) three fifths of all other Persons. The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress, and within the Interval of equal Numbers there shall be made.

It shall be the Duty of the Representatives, when they shall be assembled, to assemble in the City of New York, until otherwise provided by Law.
