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RESOLVE PROVIDING FOR AN INVESTIGATION RELATIVE TO THE PROTECTION OF PROPERTY ALONG THE WATERFRONT IN THE LITTLE NECK SECTION OF THE TOWN OF IPSWICH.

1 *Resolved*, That the department of public works is  
2 hereby authorized and directed to investigate the  
3 conditions causing the erosion of the shore along the  
4 waterfront in the Little Neck section of the town  
5 of Ipswich with a view to determining the best  
6 means of relieving or improving said conditions by  
7 the construction of breakwaters, sea walls or other  
8 shore protection. Said department shall report to  
9 the general court the results of its investigation, and  
10 its recommendations, if any, with plans and estimates  
11 of the cost of any work or improvements recom-  
12 mended by it, together with drafts of legislation  
13 necessary to carry such recommendations into effect,  
14 by filing the same with the clerk of the house of  
15 representatives on or before the first Wednesday in  
16 December in the current year.

The Constitution of the United States

Article I, Section 1, Clause 1

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Representatives and Electors in Congress shall be chosen every second Year, by the People of the several States; and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors in that State. No Person shall be a Representative who shall not, when elected, have seven Years Residence in the United States; and he shall, when elected, be seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and three Years a Citizen of that State in which he shall be chosen. And no Person shall be a Representative who shall not, when elected, have attained to the Age of twenty five Years, and seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and three Years a Citizen of that State in which he shall be chosen. Representatives and Electors shall be chosen in each State in the Manner which the Legislature thereof may direct; but the Legislature of any State may, by a majority of two thirds, change the Manner of choosing Representatives, and may also change the Manner of choosing Electors, but the Manner of choosing Electors shall not be so changed as to alter the equal Weight of each Elector. Representatives shall have no Power to impeach.
