## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Forty-Eight.

### AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE ADMISSION OF CERTAIN MINORS TO BOWLING ALLEYS.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Chapter 140 of the General Laws is hereby amended  
2 by striking out section 179, as appearing in the  
3 Tercentenary Edition, and inserting in place thereof  
4 the following: —  
5 *Section 179.* The keeper of a billiard, pool or sippio  
6 room or table, or place in which pictures are displayed  
7 upon the deposit of money in a coin controlled appa-  
8 ratus, who admits a minor thereto without the written  
9 consent of his parent or guardian, or the keeper of a  
10 bowling alley who admits thereto a minor under the  
11 age of sixteen, without such consent, shall forfeit  
12 ten dollars for the first and twenty dollars for each  
13 subsequent offence.
