## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Forty-Nine.

AN ACT REGULATING THE USE OF RECEIPTS BY CITIES AND TOWNS FROM THE OLD AGE ASSISTANCE FUND.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Section 11 of chapter 118A of the General Laws, as
- 2 most recently amended by chapter 684 of the acts of
- 3 1945, is hereby further amended by striking out, in
- 4 line 7, the words ", subject to appropriation,", and
- 5 by inserting at the end thereof the following: Said
- 6 fund shall be paid to the several cities and towns and
- 7 shall be kept as a separate account by every such city
- 8 or town and used only for the purposes specified by
- 9 this chapter, notwithstanding the provisions of sec-
- 10 tion fifty-three of chapter forty-four, so as to read
- 11 as follows: Section 11. There shall be established
- 12 and set up on the books of the commonwealth a sepa-
- 13 rate fund, to be known as the old age assistance fund,
- 14 consisting of receipts credited to said fund under chap-
- 15 ter sixty-four B, section fifteen of chapter one hundred

and twenty-eight A and section twenty-seven of chapter one hundred and thirty-eight. Said funds shall be
used for the reimbursement of cities and towns by the
commonwealth for assistance given to aged persons
under the provisions of this chapter, and shall be used
for expenses incurred by the department of public welfare for administration and supervision of such assistance. Said fund shall be paid to the several cities and
towns and shall be kept as a separate account by every
such city or town and used only for the purposes specified by this chapter, notwithstanding the provisions of
section fifty-three of chapter forty-four.
