AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE RETIREMENT OF CERTAIN PUBLIC EMPLOYEES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Notwithstanding any contrary provision of law,
2 any person who has served as a public officer or em-
3 ployee in the service of the commonwealth or of any
4 one or more of the political subdivisions thereof
5 for a total of thirty years or more, and who has
6 attained the age of sixty years, shall be retired from
7 such service at his request with an annual retirement
8 allowance equal to two thirds of the annual salary
9 or other compensation received by him at the time
10 of such retirement. If such person is a veteran, he
11 may be so retired after twenty-five years of such
12 service, and after attaining the age of fifty-five.
