AN ACT MAKING CERTAIN VETERANS OF WORLD WAR II
ELIGIBLE TO BE EXAMINED FOR REGISTRATION AS
QUALIFIED PHYSICIANS.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives
in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the
same, as follows:*

1 Notwithstanding any contrary provision of law,
2 any person who shall have served in the armed forces
3 of the United States during World War II and shall
4 have received a discharge or release, other than a dis-
5 honorable one, from such service, and who shall have
6 graduated from a medical school in this commonwealth
7 on or before June thirtieth, nineteen hundred and
8 forty-eight, and who, while a resident of this common-
9 wealth, served as an interne, as provided in section
10 nine of chapter one hundred and twelve of the General
11 Laws, for not less than one year, shall be eligible to be
12 an applicant for registration as a qualified physician,
13 shall be examined for such registration by the board of
14 registration in medicine, and shall be subject to and
15 have the benefit of all pertinent provisions of law
16 relative to such eligibility and examination.
