RESOLUTIONS MEMORIALIZING CONGRESS TO TAKE THE NECESSARY STEPS TO PREVENT EVICTION OF VETERANS AND THEIR FAMILIES FROM DEVENCREST IN THE TOWN OF AYER.

1 *Whereas*, Two hundred families of G. I.'s have
2 been served with notice from the United States Mili-
3 tary Authorities to vacate within a period of thirty
4 days the living quarters that they are now occupy-
5 ing in Devencrest at Camp Devens in the town of
6 Ayer; and

7 *Whereas*, The acute housing shortage is such that
8 these families are unable to find other suitable living
9 quarters; now therefore be it

10 *Resolved*, That the general court of Massachusetts
11 respectfully memorializes the Congress of the United
12 States to take whatever steps may be necessary to
13 prevent the military authorities from proceeding with
14 the eviction of these families; therefore be it further

15 *Resolved*, That copies of these resolutions be sent
16 forthwith by the state secretary to the President of
17 the United States, to the presiding officer of each
18 branch of Congress and to the members thereof from
19 this commonwealth.

The Constitutionality of the Bill

Resolved, That the President be authorized to take the necessary steps to prevent violation of statutes and their families from remaining in the town of Agart, Mississippi, &c.

1. Whereas, Two hundred families of the town of Agart, Mississippi, have been ordered with notice from the United States Military Authorities to vacate within a period of thirty days the living quarters that they are now occupying in the town of Agart, Mississippi, in the town of Agart, Mississippi, and
2. Whereas, The said families are such that these families are unable to find other suitable living quarters; now therefore be it
3. Resolved, That the general court of Mississippi, respectively authorize the Congress of the United States to take whatever steps may be necessary to prevent the military authorities from proceeding with the eviction of these families; therefore be it further
4. Resolved, That copies of these resolutions be sent forthwith by the state secretary to the President of the United States, to the presiding officer of each branch of Congress and to the members thereof from the community.
