MEMORANDUM FROM COMMISSIONER OF
CORPORATIONS AND TAXATION.

(See section 7 of chapter 3 of the General Laws, as amended by chapter 364 of the Acts of 1937 and section 2A of chapter 549 of the Acts of 1943.)

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives.

The above-named petition was transmitted to me by the Clerk of the Senate on November 25, 1952, with the request for a memorandum.

Carpet Club Associates Inc. was organized on January 31, 1934, under chapter 180 of the General Laws. It was dissolved by the Supreme Judicial Court on September 26, 1945.

Pursuant to notice sent by me under General Laws, chapter 3, section 7, the check for \$25 required by said section 7 was forwarded to me.

As more than five years have elapsed since the date of dissolution, it is not possible for me to revive the corporation under General Laws, chapter 155, section 56. Accordingly, the object sought by the petition cannot be accomplished under the General Laws.

PROPOSED LEGISLATION.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Fifty-Three.

AN ACT REVIVING CARPET CLUB ASSOCIATES INC.

1 *Whereas*, The deferred operation of this act would
2 delay the corporation revived thereby in resuming the
3 exercise of its former corporate powers, therefore it is
4 hereby declared to be an emergency law, necessary
5 for the immediate preservation of the public con-
6 venience.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives
in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the
same, as follows:*

1 Carpet Club Associates Inc., a corporation dis-
2 solved on September twenty-sixth, nineteen hundred
3 and forty-five, by the supreme judicial court for
4 Suffolk county, is hereby revived, with the same
5 powers, duties and obligations as if said corporation
6 had not been dissolved.
