AN ACT RELATIVE TO SICK LEAVE FOR CERTAIN EMPLOYEES OF THE METROPOLITAN DISTRICT COMMISSION.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Paragraph (10) of section 10 of chapter 92 of the
2 General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after
3 the third sentence the following two sentences: — Any
4 employee so transferring shall retain all available sick
5 leave credits accrued by him at the time of such trans-
6 fer, except that he shall not be credited with any
7 accumulated sick leave allowance in excess of ninety
8 days. In order to be credited with such available sick
9 leave allowance an employee must submit to his de-
10 partment head a sworn statement of such available
11 allowance executed by the appropriate official of the
12 town from which he transferred.
