

# HOUSE . . . . No. 914

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By Mr. Tracy of Boston (by request), petition of James S. Tremblay for a referendum to the voters of the city of Boston on the question of the adoption of a former government consisting of a mayor, a city council of twenty-two members one from each ward and a school committee of five members. Cities.

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## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

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In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Fifty-Four.

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AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE ADOPTION BY THE VOTERS OF THE CITY OF BOSTON OF THEIR FORMER PLAN OF CITY GOVERNMENT.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 At the regular state election held during the cur-  
2 rent year, the voters of the city of Boston shall vote  
3 on the following question which shall be placed on the  
4 ballot: — “Shall the city of Boston adopt the form  
5 of government consisting of a mayor, a city council  
6 consisting of twenty-two members, one from each  
7 ward and a school committee of five members elected  
8 at large?” If a majority of the voters approve of this  
9 form of government, the voters shall vote for such  
10 officers at the next regular municipal election and the  
11 officers so elected shall assume office at ten o'clock in  
12 the forenoon on the first Monday of January following  
13 such election.

It is the duty of the House to inquire into the conduct of the President and to report thereon to the Senate. It is the duty of the Senate to advise and consent to the appointment and removal of the President. It is the duty of the House to impeach the President and to report thereon to the Senate. It is the duty of the Senate to try the President and to remove him from office if he is found guilty of impeachment.

### The Constitution of the United States

Article II, Section 2, Clause 1

1. The President shall be elected in the following manner: The electors in each State shall have the right to elect electors in such manner as the Legislature of that State may direct. The number of electors in each State shall be equal to the number of Senators and Representatives to which that State may be entitled.

2. No person shall be eligible to the office of President unless he was born a natural born citizen of the United States, and he shall not be eligible for more than two terms.

3. The electors shall meet in person in each State, and they shall vote by ballot for electors in such manner as the Legislature of that State may direct.
4. The electors shall vote for electors in such manner as the Legislature of that State may direct.
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
