AN ACT RELATIVE TO REIMBURSEMENT TO CITIES AND TOWNS FOR EXPENSES INCURRED FOR TRANSPORTATION OF PUPILS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 7A of chapter 71 of the General Laws is
2 hereby amended by striking out, in clause (a), the
3 words "one and one half miles" and inserting in place
4 thereof the words:— one mile,— so that the fol-
5 lowing clause will read as follows:— (a) That no
6 transportation reimbursement shall be made on ac-
7 count of any pupil who resides less than one mile
8 from the school which he attends, measured by a
9 commonly travelled route.

The Constitution of the United States

Article I, Section 1, Clause 1

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 1. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors in that State.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors in that State.

Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Senators in that State.

Section 4. The Senators and Representatives before mentioned, and the Members of the several State Legislatures, and Electors in each State, shall have the Qualifications requisite for Senators, Representatives, and Electors in that State.

Section 5. The House of Representatives may determine the Rules and Proceedings of its own House, and may punish its Members for Disobedience of its Orders, for Disorderly Behaviour, and for Contumacious Refusal to answer any Question touching an Allegation of Breach of the Oath of Office.
