AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE ACQUISITION BY THE METROPOLITAN DISTRICT COMMISSION OF A MEMORIAL TO CIVIL WAR VETERANS IN THE CITY OF BOSTON.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The metropolitan district commission
2 is hereby authorized and directed to take by eminent
3 domain under chapter seventy-nine of the General
4 Laws, or acquire by purchase or otherwise, as a part
5 of the system of metropolitan parks under the control
6 of said commission, land under the control of the city
7 of Boston, located in the Readville district and known
8 as Camp Miegs, and bounded by Hyde Park avenue,
9 Stanbro street, Irving street and Clifford street —
10 and the commission is further directed to beautify
11 and maintain this area in a manner proper and be-
12 fitting the memory of those heroic men who served
13 in the union cause in the great war between the states.

1 SECTION 2. A portion of said area shall be set apart
2 for the laying out and construction of a children's
3 play area by said commission.

The House of Representatives and Senate in a joint session in
 the city of Washington, D. C., on the 25th day of January, 1900.
 The following bill was introduced by Mr. [Name], and read twice,
 and on the 26th day of January, 1900, the House and Senate
 concurred in passing the same, with amendments, and the same
 was approved by the President of the United States on the 27th
 day of January, 1900.

The Constitution of the United States

In the Constitution of the United States, Article I, Section 1.

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress
 of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of
 Representatives.

The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen
 every second Year by the People of the several States, and the
 Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for
 Electors in that State.

1. Section 1. The Congress shall consist of a Senate and House of
 Representatives.
 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members
 chosen every second Year by the People of the several States,
 and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications
 requisite for Electors in that State.
 3. No Representative shall be under twenty five Years of Age,
 seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and seven Years
 a Citizen of that State in which he shall be chosen.
 4. The Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications
 requisite for Electors in that State.
 5. The House of Representatives shall choose their Speaker and
 other Officers, and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.
 6. The Senate shall be composed of two Senators from each State,
 chosen by the Legislature of the State for six Years; but no
 Senator shall be under thirty Years of Age, and no Senator
 shall be a Citizen of the United States, or of that State,
 in which he shall be chosen, less than seven Years.

1. Section 2. A person of sufficient Age, and seven Years a
 Citizen of the United States, and of that State in which he
 shall be chosen, shall be qualified to be elected Representative
 in the House of Representatives.
