SENATE, July 26, 1955.

The committee on Taxation, to whom was referred the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 87) of Robert M. Ford that provision be made to continue for an additional year the reduction of taxes payable upon income derived from professions, employments, trade or business; the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 93) of Harold R. Lundgren for legislation to abolish the additional one per cent tax on certain income, and establishing the date of filing income tax returns and the time when said taxes shall be due and payable; the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 521) of Mary L. Fonseca for legislation to abolish the additional one per cent tax levied on income; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 295) of John M. Shea that provision be made for the payment of state income taxes in two instalments; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 472) of Carlton H. Bliss relative to the taxation of income earned in the Commonwealth by non-residents; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 976) of Philip J. Durkin for legislation relative to the taxation of certain classes of income; and the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 2296) of Charles R. Doyle relative to providing for the payment of state income taxes in two instalments, report the accompanying Resolve (Senate, No. 819).

### RESOLVE INCREASING THE SCOPE OF THE INVESTIGATION AND STUDY BY THE SPECIAL COMMISSION ON TAXATION.

1 *Resolved*, That the unpaid special commission, known  
2 as the special commission on taxation, established by  
3 chapter eighty-six of the resolves of nineteen hundred  
4 and forty-eight, and most recently continued by chapter  
5 thirty-two of the resolves of nineteen hundred and  
6 fifty-five, shall, in making its investigation and study,  
7 consider the subject matter of current senate documents  
8 numbered 87, 93 and 521, and current house documents  
9 numbered 295, 472, 976 and 2296.
