By Mr. Mirsky of Boston, petition of Wilfred S. Mirsky for legislation to regulate charges by telephone companies for special equipment. Power and Light.

AN ACT REGULATING CHARGES BY TELEPHONE COMPANIES FOR SPECIAL EQUIPMENT.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 15A of chapter 166 of the General
2 Laws, inserted by chapter 242 of the acts of 1935, is
3 hereby repealed.

1 SECTION 2. Chapter 166 of the General Laws, as
2 amended, is hereby further amended by inserting after
3 section fifteen the following new section:—

4 *Section 15A.* The department of public utilities shall
5 fix maximum charges to be assessed by a telephone
6 company on a subscriber for the installation and use of
7 all special equipment, including special phones, cords, etc.

The following is a summary of the report of the Committee on the Administration of the Government of the District of Columbia, as presented to the House of Representatives on July 1, 1902.

The report is divided into two parts, the first of which deals with the general administration of the Government of the District of Columbia, and the second with the administration of the various departments and bureaus.

The first part of the report deals with the general administration of the Government of the District of Columbia, and is divided into three sections: the first section deals with the organization of the Government, the second with the personnel, and the third with the financial administration.

The second part of the report deals with the administration of the various departments and bureaus, and is divided into four sections: the first section deals with the Department of Public Works, the second with the Department of Health, the third with the Department of Education, and the fourth with the Department of the Police.

The report contains a number of recommendations for the improvement of the administration of the Government of the District of Columbia, and is accompanied by a number of tables and charts illustrating the various aspects of the administration.
