

HOUSE No. 2951

By Mr. Putnam of Needham, petition of Philip F. Foss and others (selectmen) for legislation to transfer the management and care of Town Forest in Needham to the board of park commissioners of said town. Towns.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Fifty-Six.

AN ACT TRANSFERRING THE MANAGEMENT AND CARE OF THE TOWN FOREST IN NEEDHAM TO THE BOARD OF PARK COMMISSIONERS OF SAID TOWN.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of section
2 twenty-one of chapter forty-five of the General Laws,
3 the management and care of the town forest in the town
4 of Needham shall be transferred from the special town
5 forest committee of said town to the board of park com-
6 missioners of said town and shall hereafter be in charge
7 of said board of park commissioners.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

The Constitution of the State

Article I. The Legislative Power

Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Senators of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding the Elections of Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law alter or change in any or all these Particulars their Times, Places and Manner.

Section 5. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall be held in the City of Washington, District of Columbia, and on such Day of the Month of January as they shall by Law provide; but the Congress may by Law provide for one or more additional special Sessions in any Year, and may extend the same to any part of the next Year, but no longer.

Section 6. The Senators and Representatives shall receive a Compensation for their Services, to be ascertained from Time to Time by each of them in Respect to their respective States, and they shall, in Addition thereto, receive certain Allowances for Expenses actually incurred by them as Senators and Representatives respectively, which shall be ascertained from Time to Time by each of them in Respect to their respective States.

Section 7. No Senator or Representative shall be held liable in any Court for any Speech or Debate in either House; and they shall, in Addition to their respective Qualifications, be required to swear or affirm that they will support the Constitution of the United States.
