AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF BOSTON TO CONVEY CERTAIN
PARK LAND TO THE COMMONWEALTH FOR THE ERECTION
THEREON OF THE SHIRLEY-EUSTIS MANSION.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in
General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same,
as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. The board of park commissioners of the city
2 of Boston is hereby authorized to convey to the common-
3 wealth all right, title and interest in and to three acres of a
4 certain parcel of park land known as the Pine Bank and lo-
5 cated at the northeast corner of Jamaica pond in the city of
6 Boston for the purpose of erecting thereon as a landmark of
7 the commonwealth the historic Shirley-Eustis mansion, now
8 situated in the Roxbury district of the city of Boston, and
9 for all purposes incidental thereto.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its acceptance
2 by the mayor, the board of park commissioners and the city
3 council of the city of Boston.

The Constitution of the State of New York

As revised and amended to January 1, 1915

Article I. Section 1. The legislative power of this State shall be vested in a Senate and Assembly, which shall be styled the Legislature of the State of New York.

Section 2. The Senate shall be composed of twenty-four members, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the State at the general election held biennially, and for the number of the term of office of the members of the Senate shall be as follows:

1. The first class shall consist of eight members, who shall be elected for the term of four years, to begin on the 1st day of January next after the general election held in 1892, and in every fourth year thereafter.
2. The second class shall consist of eight members, who shall be elected for the term of four years, to begin on the 1st day of January next after the general election held in 1894, and in every fourth year thereafter.
3. The third class shall consist of eight members, who shall be elected for the term of four years, to begin on the 1st day of January next after the general election held in 1896, and in every fourth year thereafter.
4. The members of the Senate shall be elected by the qualified electors of the State at the general election held biennially, and for the number of the term of office of the members of the Senate shall be as follows:
5. The first class shall consist of eight members, who shall be elected for the term of four years, to begin on the 1st day of January next after the general election held in 1892, and in every fourth year thereafter.
6. The second class shall consist of eight members, who shall be elected for the term of four years, to begin on the 1st day of January next after the general election held in 1894, and in every fourth year thereafter.
7. The third class shall consist of eight members, who shall be elected for the term of four years, to begin on the 1st day of January next after the general election held in 1896, and in every fourth year thereafter.
8. The members of the Senate shall be elected by the qualified electors of the State at the general election held biennially, and for the number of the term of office of the members of the Senate shall be as follows:
9. The first class shall consist of eight members, who shall be elected for the term of four years, to begin on the 1st day of January next after the general election held in 1892, and in every fourth year thereafter.

Section 3. The Assembly shall be composed of fifty members, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the State at the general election held biennially, and for the number of the term of office of the members of the Assembly shall be as follows:
