AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE WIDENING OF THE BRIDGE IN THE CITY OF MEDFORD KNOWN AS THE HARVARD STREET BRIDGE IN SOUTH MEDFORD FOR THE PURPOSE OF ELIMINATING DANGEROUS CONDITIONS PRESENTLY EXISTING THERE.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

- 1 The department of public works is hereby authorized and
- 2 directed to widen the bridge in the city of Medford known as
- 3 the Harvard Street bridge in South Medford for the purpose of
- 4 eliminating the dangerous condition presently existing there.
- 5 For the purposes of this act, said department may expend such
- 6 sums as may hereafter be appropriated.

## The Constitution of Connecticut

As amended to the 19th of July, 1901

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF CONNECTICUT, AS AMENDED TO THE 19TH OF JULY, 1901.

ARTICLE I.

SECTION 1. The legislative power of this State shall be vested in the Senate and House of Representatives, who shall be styled the General Assembly.

SECTION 2. The Senate shall be composed of not more than twelve members, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the State, and shall hold office for two years, and shall be eligible for re-election.

SECTION 3. The House of Representatives shall be composed of not more than thirty-six members, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the State, and shall hold office for two years, and shall be eligible for re-election.

SECTION 4. The General Assembly shall assemble on the first Monday in January of each year, and shall continue its sessions until the adjournment thereof.

SECTION 5. The General Assembly shall have the sole power of initiating and passing bills of appropriation, and no bill of appropriation shall be passed without the concurrence of a majority of the members of each house.

SECTION 6. The General Assembly shall have the sole power of originating bills for the raising of revenue, and no bill for the raising of revenue shall be passed without the concurrence of a majority of the members of each house.
