

HOUSE No. 1156

By Mr. Marr of Lynn (by request), petition of Thomas P. Costin, Jr. (mayor), members of the city council and others that the city of Lynn be authorized to grant a right of way over certain park land in said city to the Valladolid Building Association of Lynn, Mass. Cities.

AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF LYNN TO GRANT A RIGHT OF WAY
TO VALLADOLID BUILDING ASSOCIATION OF LYNN, MASS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The city of Lynn, by its proper authorities,
2 may grant a fifty-foot right of way to the Valladolid Building
3 Association of Lynn, Massachusetts, to be used for all purposes
4 for which a right of way is commonly used, over land of the city
5 of Lynn, as shown on plan entitled "Plan of 50 Ft. Easement
6 Over Land of City of Lynn," dated November six, nineteen
7 hundred and fifty-seven, signed by William B. Hilton, city
8 engineer.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon acceptance during
2 the current year by vote of the board of park commissioners of
3 said city, and by vote of the city council of said city, subject to
4 the provisions of its charter, but not otherwise.

The Constitution of the State

Article I

The legislative power shall be vested in a Senate and House of Representatives, which shall be styled the General Assembly. The Senate shall be composed of twelve members, and the House of Representatives of twenty members, to be chosen by the people for the term of two years. The Senate shall be elected by the qualified electors of the State, and the House of Representatives by the qualified electors of the several counties. The General Assembly shall assemble on the first Monday in January of each year, and shall continue its session until the first Monday in January of the next year. The General Assembly shall have the sole power of initiating and passing bills, and shall have the power to impeach and remove from office any officer of the State. The General Assembly shall also have the power to create and alter the offices of the State, and to determine the qualifications and duties of the officers thereof.
