The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE TRAPPING, FISHING OR TAKING OF GREEN
CRABS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 37 of chapter 130 of the General Laws
2 is hereby amended by adding, after the words:—“edible
3 crabs”, in the first paragraph, the words:—and green crabs.
4 Said section 37 is also further amended by striking out in the
5 third paragraph the second sentence commencing with the
6 word:—“Nothing”,—and ending with the word:—“pur-
7 poses.”

1 SECTION 2. Section 38 of said chapter 130 is further amended
2 by adding after the words:—“edible crabs”, in each instance,
3 the words:—and green crabs.

1 SECTION 3. Section 39 of said chapter 130 is further amended
2 by inserting after the words:—“edible crabs” the words:—
3 and green crabs.

1 SECTION 4. Section 33 of said chapter 130 is further amended
2 by inserting, after the words:—“edible crabs”, in each and
3 every instance, the words:—and green crabs.

1 SECTION 5. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

Article I, Section 1

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature of the State in which they may be, and they shall hold their Offices for Terms of Years, which shall not exceed six.

Section 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding the Elections of Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law alter or add to the Rules and Regulations of the foregoing Elections.

Section 5. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall begin on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by Law provide otherwise.

Section 6. The Senators and Representatives shall receive Compensation for their Services, which shall be ascertained from Time to Time by the Congress.
