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AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE STATUS, CLASSIFICATION AND COMPENSATION OF NURSES SERVING UNDER SCHOOL COMMITTEES, SUPERINTENDENCY DISTRICTS OR SUPERINTENDENCY UNIONS.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Chapter 71 of the General Laws is hereby amended by in-  
2 serting after section 53B, as appearing in the Tercentenary  
3 Edition, the following section:—

4 *Section 53C.* School nurses appointed pursuant to section  
5 fifty-three shall have the rights of tenure of service given other  
6 school personnel by sections forty-one and forty-two, and they  
7 and any school nurses appointed pursuant to section fifty-  
8 three A shall be classified and compensated as professional  
9 personnel.
