AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE WIDENING OF CERTAIN THOROUGHFARES
IN HYDE PARK.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The department of public works is hereby au-
2 thorized and directed to widen River street in Hyde Park from
3 Cleary square to Logan square and Fairmount avenue in Hyde
4 Park from Logan square to Pierce street.

1 SECTION 2. For the purposes of this act, said department may
2 expend such sums as may hereafter be appropriated therefor.
