MEMORANDUM OF COMMISSIONER OF CORPORATIONS AND TAXATION PURSUANT TO GENERAL LAWS, CHAPTER 3, SECTION 7, WITH RESPECT TO PETITION OF J. ROBERT MAHAN FOR LEGISLATION TO AUTHORIZE THE LEOMINSTER FIREFIGHTERS RELIEF ASSOCIATION TO PAY A SUM OF MONEY TO CARL TYLER, A RETIRED MEMBER OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF LEOMINSTER.

*To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives.*

The above-named petition was transmitted to me by the Clerk of the House Committee on Rules on February 3, 1959, with a request for a memorandum.

The above-named corporation, Leominster Firefighters Relief Association, was organized March 12, 1879, under the name of Leominster Firemen's Relief Association, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 375 of the Acts of 1874, which act is entitled "An act concerning associations for religious, charitable, educational and other purposes." It assumed its present title December 17, 1957.

The bill before your honorable bodies provides that notwithstanding any provisions of law to the contrary, the above corporation is authorized to pay the sum of \$350 from the funds of said association to one Carl Tyler, who is described as a retired member of the Leominster Fire Department. It is to be noted that the same subject matter was originally covered in current House Bill No. 2392, section 2 thereof. I pointed out in a memorandum to your honorable bodies dated December 29, 1958, which was attached to said bill, that the said Tyler was simply described as a retired member and that it was not indicated whether he was a member of said corporation.

Special legislation is required to bring about the desired result.

Where a fund of a corporation such as described in the petition is involved, it is respectfully suggested that an opinion on the merits of the bill be obtained from the Insurance Commissioner.

No fee is payable.

AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE LEOMINSTER FIREFIGHTERS RELIEF ASSOCIATION TO PAY A SUM OF MONEY TO |CARL TYLER, A RETIRED MEMBER OF THE LEOMINSTER FIRE DEPARTMENT.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any provisions of law to the  
2 contrary, the Leominster Firefighters Relief Association is hereby  
3 authorized to pay the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars  
4 from the funds of said association to Carl Tyler, a retired mem-  
5 ber of the Leominster fire department.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.
