The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE REINSTATEMENT OF NATHAN PEARL IN THE SERVICE OF THE METROPOLITAN TRANSIT AUTHORITY FOR THE SOLE PURPOSE OF RETIREMENT.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Nathan Pearl, who was employed by the Metro-
2 politan Transit Authority and the Boston Elevated Railway
3 Company for more than thirty-two years, shall be reinstated in
4 the service of said Authority for the sole purpose of being re-
5 tired under the Metropolitan Transit Authority Retirement
6 Fund as hereinafter provided. Upon such reinstatement, said
7 Pearl shall pay into said Fund the amount of his regular con-
8 tributions withdrawn by him when he became separated from
9 the service of said Authority. After such reinstatement and de-
10 posit, said Pearl shall be retired and shall receive a retirement
11 allowance as provided by the rules and regulations under which
12 said fund was established by the board of trustees of said Au-
13 thority under the provisions of chapter five hundred and forty-
14 four of the acts of nineteen hundred and forty-seven.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.
