## The Commonwealth of Wassachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty-One.

Resolve providing for an Investigation relative to Improving the Condition of the Charles River in the Cities of Waltham and Newton and the Towns of Weston and Watertown.

Resolved. That the metropolitan district com-2 mission and the state department of public 3 health acting as a joint board are hereby author-4 ized and directed to investigate the conditions 5 affecting the flow of water in Charles river in 6 that portion of its course lying between Charles 7 River village and the head of the Charles River 8 basin at Watertown and the amounts of water 9 withdrawn or diverted therefrom to determine 10 whether and to what extent the public health, 11 comfort and convenience are affected by the 12 diversion of water from said river and its water-13 shed and by present methods and practices of 14 holding, drawing, using and diverting the water 15 at the various dams within the limits mentioned 16 herein, and to recommend methods for removing 17 any objectionable conditions that may be found 18 to exist, especially in the section of the river 19 within the limits of Weston, Newton, Waltham 20 and Watertown. The said board may employ 21 such engineering and other assistants as it may 22 deem necessary to carry out the purposes of this 23 resolve and may, subject to the approval of the 24 governor's council, fix the compensation of 25 such assistants. Offices and positions created 26 under authority of this resolve shall not be sub-27 ject to classification under sections forty-five to 28 fifty, inclusive, of chapter thirty of the General 29 Laws, nor shall chapter thirty-one of the General 30 Laws nor the rules and regulations made there-

31 under apply to such assistants; but upon the

32 request of said board the division of civil service

33 shall hold special examinations for candidates

34 for such offices and positions.

35 Said board may expend for the purposes of 36 this resolve such sum not exceeding in the aggre-37 gate seven thousand five hundred dollars as may 38 be appropriated by the general court, the same 39 to be assessed back upon the cities and towns in 40 the metropolitan parks district in proportion to 41 their respective taxable valuations as defined in 42 section fifty-nine of chapter ninety-two of the 43 General Laws.

44 Said board shall report to the general court 45 the results of its several investigations, including 46 plans, recommendations and estimates of the 47 cost of any works or improvements that it may 48 recommend, together with drafts of legislation to 49 carry such recommendations into effect by filing 50 the same with the clerk of the house of representatives on or before the first Wednesday in December in the year nineteen hundred and thirty-one 53 and shall at the same time file a copy of said 54 report with the budget commissioner.
