## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty-One.

An Act relative to Second Assistant Assessors in the Assessing Department of the City of Boston.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. Chapter ninety-three of the  
2 special acts of nineteen hundred and eighteen is  
3 hereby amended by inserting after section four  
4 the following new section: —

5 *Section 4A.* The board of assessors may, sub-  
6 ject to like approval, appoint not exceeding  
7 twenty-three second assistant assessors, who shall  
8 be subject to the civil service laws and rules and  
9 regulations; whose term of office shall be un-  
10 limited, except that any person so appointed may  
11 be removed in accordance with such laws and  
12 rules and regulations, and whose compensation  
13 shall be fixed by the board of assessors with the  
14 approval of the city council.

1 SECTION 2. All persons who on January first  
2 in the current year were employed in said assess-  
3 ing department and were then designated by said  
4 board of assessors, with the approval of said  
5 mayor, as second assistant assessors may continue

6 to hold such office without taking a civil service  
7 examination.

1 SECTION 3. This act shall take effect upon its  
2 acceptance during the current year by vote of the  
3 city council of said city, subject to the provisions  
4 of its charter, but not otherwise.
