THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

AS AMENDED BY THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION OF 1875

CHAPTER I. OF THE LEGISLATIVE POWER.

SECTION 1. The legislative power of this State shall be vested in the Senate and House of Representatives, which shall be styled the Legislature of the State of Texas.

SECTION 2. The Senate shall be composed of one member from each county, to be elected by the qualified electors of the county in which he resides, for a term of two years, and shall hold office until the next meeting of the Senate.

SECTION 3. The House of Representatives shall be composed of members chosen by the qualified electors of the several counties, in proportion to their respective populations, as ascertained by the last preceding census, so that the number of representatives shall not exceed one for every five thousand inhabitants, and shall hold office until the next meeting of the House.

SECTION 4. The Legislature shall assemble annually on the first Monday in September, and shall continue its session until the first day of September following, unless it shall adjourn earlier.

SECTION 5. The Legislature shall hold its sessions in the city of Austin, unless it shall adjourn to some other place.

SECTION 6. The Legislature shall have the power to adjourn from time to time, and to reconvene at such other place as it may determine.

SECTION 7. The Legislature shall have the power to pass bills for the raising, borrowing, and expending of money, and to regulate the public debt of the State.
