

SENATE No. 141

To accompany the petition of Roger E. Barrus and others that the town of Shutesbury be authorized to take over for school purposes the Center Cemetery in said town. Towns.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty-Seven.

An Act to authorize the Town of Shutesbury, acting through its School Committee, to take over for School Purposes the Center Cemetery in Shutesbury.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 The town of Shutesbury, acting by and through
2 its school committee, is hereby authorized to take
3 over the Center Cemetery so called, in Shutesbury
4 for school purposes, said cemetery being roughly
5 described as follows:

6 Bounded north, ten rods nineteen links more or
7 less on land of the Town of Shutesbury; east twelve
8 rods and four links more or less on land of Albert
9 Anderson; south ten rods five links more or less on
10 land of Angenora Jepson; and west twelve rods and
11 fifteen links more or less on land of Angenora Jepson,
12 together with the driveway from the Leverett Road
13 to said cemetery running past the present school
14 house.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE SENATE

The Senate is composed of two Senators from each State, and two Senators from the District of Columbia, elected by the electors in each State and the electors in the District of Columbia respectively.

The Senators in each State have equal vote. The Senators from the District of Columbia have no vote.

The Senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose, it shall be sworn or affirmed, and shall hold its sittings in public, unless the Senate shall in any case determine that it shall sit in private.

For the trial of impeachments, the Senate shall have the power to issue subpoenas, and to hold witnesses before it, and to examine them under oath, and to administer oaths, and to receive evidence, and to hear and determine the same.

The Senate shall have the power to confirm and reject all appointments made by the President, and to give and withhold its assent to all treaties made by the President, and to give and withhold its assent to all bills passed by the House of Representatives.

The Senate shall have the power to propose amendments to the Constitution, and to ratify amendments proposed by the States, and to ratify amendments proposed by the States.
