MEMORANDUM FROM COMMISSIONER OF CORPORATIONS AND TAXATION.

(See section 7 of chapter 3 of the General Laws, as amended by chapter 364 of the Acts of 1937.)

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives.

The above-named petition was transmitted to me by the Clerk of the Senate December 13, 1938.

Holyoke Box and Lumber Company was organized as a business corporation January 30, 1908. It was dissolved by chapter 8 of the Acts of 1935. The petition seeks to have the corporation revived for the sole purpose of selling and conveying title to certain property situated in the city of Chicopee and for the purpose of distributing the proceeds of said sale among those entitled thereto. As the period during which the corporation could have been revived under the provisions of section 56 of chapter 155 of the General Laws has expired, the General Court alone has authority to revive the corporation. It is accordingly clear that the object sought by the petition cannot be accomplished under the General Laws.

The fee of \$25 required by General Laws, chapter 3, section 7, has been paid.

AN ACT REVIVING HOLYOKE BOX AND LUMBER COMPANY, A CORPORATION, FOR CERTAIN PURPOSES.

1 *Whereas*, The deferred operation of this act would
2 tend to defeat its purpose, therefore it is hereby
3 declared to be an emergency law, necessary for the
4 immediate preservation of the public convenience.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Holyoke Box and Lumber Company, a corpora-
2 tion dissolved by section one of chapter eight of the
3 acts of nineteen hundred and thirty-five, is hereby
4 revived and continued for a period of two years
5 from the effective date of this act for the sole pur-
6 pose of selling and conveying title to certain prop-
7 erty situated in the city of Chicopee and for the
8 purpose of distributing the proceeds of said sale
9 among those entitled thereto.

The Constitution of the Republic

Article I. The legislative power shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 1. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall elect their Speaker and other Officers; and shall chuse at least once in every Year one of their Members to be President pro tempore, in the Absence of the Speaker.

Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Representatives of the United States. When vacancies happen in the Representation from any State, the Legislature of that State may fill such Vacancies until the next Meeting of the Congress.
