AN ACT PROVIDING LIFE TENURE FOR FRANCIS L. HUGHES, INCUMBENT OF THE OFFICES OF TOWN CLERK AND OF TREASURER OF THE TOWN OF MARSHFIELD.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. The tenure of office of Francis L. Hughes,  
2 incumbent of the offices of town clerk and town treasurer of  
3 the town of Marshfield shall be unlimited in each of said  
4 offices, but he may be removed by the board of selectmen  
5 from either or both of said offices for cause after hearing in  
6 the manner provided by section forty-three of chapter thirty-  
7 one of the General Laws.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall be submitted for acceptance to  
2 the voters of the town of Marshfield at its next annual town  
3 meeting in the form of the following question, which shall be  
4 placed upon the official ballot to be used for the election of  
5 town officers at said meeting: — "Shall an act passed by the  
6 General Court in the year nineteen hundred and sixty-three,  
7 entitled 'An Act providing life tenure for Francis L. Hughes,  
8 incumbent of the offices of town clerk and of treasurer of the  
9 town of Marshfield', be accepted?" If a majority of the votes  
10 in answer to said question is in the affirmative, this act shall  
11 thereupon take full effect, but not otherwise.
