AN ACT PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR REFUSING OR OBSTRUCTING ENTRY
OF AN INSPECTOR OF APIARIES OR HIS ASSISTANTS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Chapter 128 of the General Laws is hereby amended by
2 striking out section 38, as most recently amended by chapter
3 506 of the acts of 1951, and inserting in place thereof the
4 following section: —
5 *Section 38.* Whoever violates any provision of sections
6 thirty-three, thirty-five or thirty-six shall be punished for the
7 first offense by a fine of not more than thirty dollars, for a
8 second offense by a fine of not more than seventy-five dollars
9 and for a subsequent offense by a fine of not more than one
10 hundred and fifty dollars.
