AN ACT ESTABLISHING THE COMMITTEE TO KEEP MASSACHUSETTS BEAUTIFUL.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter 6 of the General Laws is hereby amended by
2 adding after section 153, inserted by section 2 of chapter 624
3 of the acts of 1966, under the caption, COMMITTEE TO KEEP
4 MASSACHUSETTS BEAUTIFUL, the following section: —

5 *Section 154.* There shall be a committee to be known as the
6 Committee to Keep Massachusetts Beautiful, to consist of
7 fifteen members to be appointed by the governor for a term
8 of two years. The committee shall encourage and promote
9 civic and natural beautification generally throughout the
10 commonwealth; provided, however, that this section shall
11 not be construed as authorizing said committee to exercise
12 any power, function or duty conferred or imposed by law on
13 any other committee, or any department, board, commission,
14 agency or officer. The chairman of the committee shall be
15 designated annually by the committee members. The mem-
16 bers shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed
17 for their expenses actually and necessarily incurred in the
18 performance of their duties. The committee shall be pro-
19 vided with suitable quarters in the state house or elsewhere
20 in the city of Boston. The committee shall make an annual
21 report to the general court and a copy thereof shall be sent
22 to the governor and the state secretary.
