## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty.

An Act relative to the Education of Crippled Children.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Chapter seventy-one of the General Laws is  
2 hereby amended by adding at the end thereof the  
3 following new section:

4 *Section 75.* The school committee of every  
5 town shall annually ascertain, under regulations  
6 prescribed by the department and the commis-  
7 sioner of public welfare, the number of children of  
8 school age and resident therein who are crippled.  
9 In any town where there are five or more children  
10 at the beginning of any school year so crippled as  
11 to make attendance at a public school not fea-  
12 sible, and who are ineligible for, or if eligible  
13 cannot be accommodated at, a public or private  
14 institution, the school committee shall, *and in*  
15 *any town where there are less than five may,* employ  
16 a teacher or teachers, *on full or part time,* who  
17 shall, with the approval in each case of the depart-  
18 ment and the commissioner of public welfare,  
19 offer instruction to said children in their homes or  
20 at such places and under such conditions as the  
21 committee may arrange.
