The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty-Two.

An Act apportioning the Cost of the Abolition of Grade Crossings.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section seventy of chapter one hundred and fifty-
2 nine of the General Laws, as most recently amended
3 by section three of chapter four hundred and seven-
4 teen of the acts of nineteen hundred and thirty,
5 is hereby further amended by striking out the sixth
6 sentence and inserting in place thereof the follow-
7 ing:— The remainder of said total cost shall be
8 paid forty-nine per cent by the commonwealth and
9 one per cent by the city or town.
