To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

In compliance with General Laws, chapter 127, section 152, I submit herewith a list of pardons granted by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Council during the year 1932.

JOSEPH B. ELY.

JAMES PATTERSON. — Sentenced May 13, 1930, in the Hampden Superior Court to serve four terms of eight to ten years, and two terms of fifteen to twenty years, to be served concurrently in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crimes of burglary, breaking and entering, assault with a dangerous weapon with intent to commit rape. Sentences commuted to two and one-half to five years January 27, 1932.

FRANK BREWER. — Sentenced June 21, 1923, in the Middlesex Superior Court to serve a term of fifteen to twenty years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of manslaughter. Pardoned on parole conditions February 3, 1932.

ANGELO DIELETTA. — Sentenced May 20, 1912, in the Hampden Superior Court to serve a term of life in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of murder, second degree. Pardoned on parole conditions February 3, 1932.

CAESAR BENDA. — Sentenced June 5, 1929, in the Suffolk Superior Court to serve a term of three to six years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of abuse of a female child. Granted a full pardon February 3, 1932.

GUIDO CIPPOLINI. — Sentenced June 27, 1929, in the Bristol Superior Court to serve a term of five to six years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of assault and battery with a dangerous weapon. Pardoned on parole conditions February 10, 1932.

SALVATORE ACCAMPORO. — Sentenced November 28, 1911, in the Suffolk Superior Court to serve a term of life

in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of murder in the second degree. Pardoned on parole conditions February 10, 1932.

WILLIAM J. FERNETTE. — Sentenced May 13, 1929, in the Hampden Superior Court to serve a term of four to five years and two terms of four to five years from and after in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of perjury. Sentences commuted to four to five years March 2, 1932.

SAMUEL F. RACICOT. — Sentenced May 13, 1929, in the Hampden Superior Court to serve a term of four to five years and two terms of four to five years from and after in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of perjury. Sentences commuted to four to five years March 2, 1932.

WILLIAM KILINSKI. — Sentenced February 26, 1926, in the Essex Superior Court to serve a term of fifteen to twenty years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of robbery. Pardoned on parole conditions March 23, 1932.

SCOTT ADAMS. — Sentenced October 11, 1929, in the Hampden Superior Court to serve a term of two years and two years from and after in the Springfield Jail for the crime of forgery and uttering, and granted a parole by the Board of Parole December 24, 1931. Granted a full pardon March 30, 1932.

MICHAEL J. MERCER. — Sentenced October 14, 1929, in the Plymouth Superior Court to serve a term of five years and one day in the Massachusetts Reformatory for the crime of breaking and entering to steal. Granted a full pardon April 6, 1932.

GEORGE J. BENOIT. — Sentenced June 30, 1927, in the Middlesex Superior Court to serve a term of nine to twelve years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of assault with intent to rape. Pardoned on parole conditions April 13, 1932.

HENRY H. BERMAN. — Sentenced November 26, 1930, in the Suffolk Superior Court to serve a term of five to seven years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of robbery. Pardoned April 20, 1932.

EDWIN RAY SNOW. — Sentenced January 1, 1900, in the Barnstable Superior Court to be electrocuted for the crime of murder, first degree. Sentence commuted to imprisonment for life in the Massachusetts State Prison by the Governor and Council January 11, 1900. Pardoned on parole conditions April 20, 1932.

JAMES M. CASALI. — Sentenced October 5, 1927, in the Middlesex Superior Court to serve a term of three to five years and three to five years from and after in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of attempting to bribe a police officer. Pardoned on parole conditions February 11, 1931. Granted a full pardon April 20, 1932.

LEWIS ABBRUZZESE. — Sentenced January 22, 1930, in the Essex Superior Court to serve three sentences of three to four years each, a total of nine to twelve years, in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of larceny of an automobile, having burglar tools in his possession and loaded revolvers without a permit. Sentence commuted to three to four years June 1, 1932.

HOWARD STEWARD. — Sentenced April 24, 1911, in the Hampden Superior Court to serve a term of life in the

Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of murder, second degree. Pardoned on parole conditions June 1, 1932.

PETER BAGOIAN. — Sentenced October 20, 1930, in the Middlesex Superior Court to serve a term of two and one-half to three and one-half years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of burning a building. Pardoned on parole conditions June 1, 1932.

RICHARD H. TUSON. — Sentenced September 26, 1930, in the Essex Superior Court to serve a term of four years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of manslaughter. Pardoned on parole conditions June 22, 1932.

SYLVESTER N. FERNANDES. — Sentenced May 20, 1932, in the Barnstable Superior Court to suffer the penalty of death for the crime of murder in the first degree, within the week beginning Sunday, July 10, 1932. Sentence respited to and including Wednesday, August 10, 1932, on June 22, 1932.

ISADORE RABINOVITZ. — Sentenced November 23, 1931, in the Suffolk Superior Court to serve a term of two and one-half to three years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of accessory before the fact to burning a building. Pardoned on parole conditions August 1, 1932.

KAROL CUMMINGS. — Sentenced September 25, 1930, in the Norfolk Superior Court to serve a term of three to five years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of assault to rape. Pardoned on parole conditions August 17, 1932.

JOHN FRONGILLO. — Sentenced March 24, 1922, in the Middlesex Superior Court to serve a term of eighteen to

twenty years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of manslaughter. Pardoned on parole conditions August 17, 1932.

JESSE E. MEDEIROS. — Sentenced November 13, 1930, in the Bristol Superior Court to serve a five years' indeterminate sentence at the Massachusetts Reformatory for the crime of breaking and entering a shop in the night time and larceny, and released on parole February 19, 1932. Granted a full pardon August 17, 1932.

FRANK FERRARA. — Sentenced February 8, 1932, in the Suffolk Superior Court to serve sentences of three to five years for forgery and three to five years from and after in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of uttering forged instruments. Pardoned on parole conditions August 17, 1932.

GEORGE A. SWEETSER. — Sentenced April 5, 1928, in the Suffolk Superior Court to serve a term of six to seven years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of larceny, and sentenced October 9, 1928, in the Middlesex Superior Court to serve two and one-half to five years on and after in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of larceny. Pardoned on parole conditions August 24, 1932.

FRANK HOWARD. — Sentenced January 17, 1897, in the Suffolk Superior Court to serve a term of life in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of robbery, and pardoned on parole conditions by the Governor and Council on November 16, 1914; arrested August 30, 1932, and placed in the custody of the Warden of the State Prison, charged with violation of the conditions of his parole. Ordered discharged from further imprisonment September 7, 1932.

FRANK L. METIVER. — Sentenced May 13, 1929, in the Hampden Superior Court to serve a term of ten to twelve years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of breaking, entering and larceny. Pardoned on parole conditions September 7, 1932.

HARRY BARGER. — Sentenced February 18, 1931, in the Suffolk Superior Court to serve a term of two years in the House of Correction at Deer Island for the crime of larceny and to pay a fine of \$500 on one count of conspiracy to steal. Pardoned on parole conditions September 7, 1932.

STEVE KOPKA. — Sentenced June 22, 1931, in the Hampshire Superior Court to serve a term of two and one-half years in the Northampton House of Correction for the crime of manslaughter. Pardoned on parole conditions September 14, 1932.

THEODORE PREBLOD. — Sentenced June 18, 1930, in the Bristol Superior Court to serve a term of three to ten years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of assault with intent to rape. Pardoned on parole conditions September 14, 1932.

VINCENZO IEMELLO. — Sentenced December 16, 1910, in the Berkshire Superior Court to serve a term of life in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of murder, second degree. Pardoned on parole conditions September 21, 1932.

BIASO VALESTRINO. — Sentenced December 8, 1914, in the Suffolk Superior Court to serve a term of life in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of murder,

second degree. Pardoned conditioned that when released he be placed on a ship and sent to Italy never to return, October 5, 1932.

ALPHONSE ALBA. — Sentenced June 24, 1930, in the Suffolk Superior Court to serve terms of three to five years and three to five years concurrently in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crimes of being accessory before the fact to the burning of a building with intent to defraud the insurer, and accessory before the fact to burning chattels with intent to defraud the insurer. Pardoned on parole conditions October 19, 1932.

JAMES ALBA. — Sentenced June 24, 1930, in the Suffolk Superior Court to serve terms of three to five years, and three to five years concurrently at the Massachusetts State Prison for the crimes of being accessory before the fact to the burning of a building with intent to defraud the insurer, and accessory before the fact to burning chattels with intent to defraud the insurer. Pardoned on parole conditions October 19, 1932.

FRANK E. RYAN. — Sentenced January 8, 1912, in the Middlesex Superior Court to serve a term of life in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of murder, second degree. Pardoned on parole conditions November 22, 1932.

CHIEFTAN M. VIDITO. — Sentenced February 17, 1930, in the Middlesex Superior Court to serve terms of six to eight years and two and one-half to three years, to be served concurrently in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crimes of robbery armed and carrying a revolver without a permit. Pardoned on parole conditions November 22, 1932.

CHARLES ROLLINS. — Sentenced December 8, 1919, in the Suffolk Superior Court to serve a term of life in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of murder, second degree. Pardoned on parole conditions November 30, 1932.

ALPHONSE ORIOLA. — Sentenced June 4, 1926, in the Worcester Superior Court to serve a term of one year in the Worcester House of Correction for the crime of stealing an automobile valued at \$500 and released April 29, 1927. Granted a full pardon December 15, 1932.

HOLLY HOLLIVER. — Sentenced March 3, 1931, in Suffolk Superior Court to serve a term of four to six years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of assault and battery with intent to rob. Pardoned on parole conditions, with the further condition that when released he be committed to a hospital for epileptics, and there remain until such time as the medical director, together with the Commissioner of Correction, shall determine that he can safely be returned to his home, on December 15, 1932.

JAMES P. ALMEIDA. — Sentenced June 13, 1925, in the Bristol Superior Court to serve a term of eight to ten years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of robbery. Granted a full pardon December 21, 1932.

JOSEPH SILIPO. — Sentenced January 30, 1926, in the Plymouth Superior Court to serve a term of fifteen to eighteen years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of manslaughter. Pardoned on parole conditions December 21, 1932.

ANTONIO CARPENITO. — Sentenced June 27, 1905, in the Plymouth Superior Court to serve a term of life in the

Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of murder, second degree. Pardoned on parole conditions December 21, 1932.

JOHN DALEY. — Sentenced November 16, 1927, in the Bristol Superior Court to serve a term of ten to twelve years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of robbery. Pardoned on parole conditions December 21, 1932.

JOHN POULACAS. — Sentenced February 8, 1915, in the Hampden Superior Court to serve a term of life in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of murder, second degree. Pardoned on parole conditions, with the further condition that when released he be placed aboard a ship and sent to Greece never to return, December 21, 1932.

FRANK T. GOLDING. — Sentenced December 21, 1925, in the Suffolk Superior Court to serve a term of twelve to twenty years in the Massachusetts State Prison for the crime of robbery armed. Pardoned on parole conditions December 21, 1932.
