

# HOUSE . . . . No. 1196

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By Mr. Doyle of Malden, petition of John D. Devir, mayor, that the school committee of the city of Malden be enlarged. Education.

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## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty-Three.

An Act to increase the Number of Members of the School Committee of the City of Malden.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. The school committee of the city of  
2 Malden shall hereafter consist of seven members, one  
3 from each ward to be elected as follows: — one being  
4 selected from the qualified voters of each ward shall  
5 biennially be elected by the qualified voters of the  
6 city voting in their respective wards. No person  
7 shall be elected to the committee who is not an in-  
8 habitant of the city and has not been a resident for at  
9 least three years continuously prior to the election.  
10 The school committee shall serve without compensa-  
11 tion and their terms of office shall begin with the  
12 beginning of the municipal year following their  
13 election. At the biennial municipal election next fol-  
14 lowing the acceptance of this act, as hereinafter  
15 provided, and at each biennial election thereafter,  
16 seven persons shall be elected as aforesaid to hold

17 office for two years. Vacancies in said committee  
18 arising from the death, resignation or otherwise  
19 shall be filled for the unexpired term in the manner  
20 provided in section twenty-four of chapter one hun-  
21 dred and sixty-nine of the acts of the year eighteen  
22 hundred and eighty-one.

1 SECTION 2. The two members of the present school  
2 committee whose terms of office expire in nineteen  
3 hundred and thirty-four in accordance with the pro-  
4 visions of chapter one hundred and thirteen of the  
5 year nineteen hundred and eight shall continue to  
6 hold office until the committee provided for by this  
7 act is duly organized. Upon the organization of the  
8 school committee elected under and in accordance  
9 with the provisions of this act, the terms of office of  
10 the members of the present school committee shall  
11 end, and their powers and duties shall cease.

1 SECTION 3. The school committee elected under  
2 and in accordance with the provisions of this act  
3 shall be the lawful successors of the present school  
4 committee, and shall be entitled to all the powers  
5 and privileges conferred, and subject to the duties  
6 and obligations imposed, by said chapter one hun-  
7 dred and sixty-nine, and acts in amendment thereof  
8 and in addition thereto.

1 SECTION 4. So much of any act as is inconsistent  
2 herewith is hereby repealed.

1 SECTION 5. This act shall be submitted to the  
2 voters of the city of Malden at the annual state elec-

tion held in November, nineteen hundred and thirty-  
four, and the form of the question to be placed upon  
the ballot shall be as follows:—“Shall chapter  
of the acts of the year nineteen hundred  
and thirty-three, being ‘An Act to increase the num-  
ber of members of the school committee of the city  
of Malden,’ be accepted?” and if a majority of the  
voters voting thereon shall vote in the affirmative  
this act shall take effect.

SECTION 6. So much of this act as authorized its  
submission to the voters of the said city shall take  
effect upon its passage, but it shall not further take  
effect until accepted by the voters of the city as  
herein provided.
