In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty-Three.

An Act prohibiting the Taking of Certain Herring or Alewives from the Waters of Plymouth Harbor, Kingston Bay, Duxbury Bay and Certain Waters of Plymouth Bay.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter one hundred and thirty of the General
2 Laws, as appearing in the Tercentenary edition
3 thereof, is hereby amended by inserting after section
4 forty-eight the following new section: —

5 *Section 48A.* Whoever takes any herring or ale-
6 wives less than four inches in length from the waters
7 of Plymouth harbor, Kingston bay, Duxbury bay or
8 from that part of the waters of Plymouth bay lying
9 westerly of an imaginary line drawn from the north-
10 easterly extremity of Rocky Point to Gurnet Light,
11 shall be punished by a fine of not less than five nor
12 more than fifty dollars.
