## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty-Five.

An Act exempting Veterans of the Spanish War, the Philippine Insurrection or the Chinese Relief Expedition from Certain Requirements of the Civil Service Laws.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Chapter thirty-one of the General Laws is hereby  
2 amended by striking out section twenty-two, as  
3 appearing in the Tercentenary edition, and inserting  
4 in place thereof the following:—

5 *Section 22.* A veteran of the civil war, or a person  
6 who has received a medal of honor as provided in the  
7 preceding section, may apply to the commissioner for  
8 appointment or employment in the classified civil  
9 service without examination. A veteran of the  
10 Spanish war, the Philippine insurrection or the  
11 Chinese relief expedition may likewise apply to the  
12 commissioner for appointment or employment without  
13 examination in such service except in the police and  
14 fire departments of cities and towns and in the state  
15 and metropolitan police forces. Every such veteran  
16 applying as aforesaid shall in his application state  
17 on oath the facts required by the rules. Age, loss of  
18 limb or other disability which does not in fact inca-  
19 pacitate shall not disqualify him for appointment or

20 employment under this section. Appointing officers  
21 may make requisition for the names of any or all such  
22 veterans and appoint or employ any of them.
