In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Fifty-Seven.

AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE PLACING OF THE OFFICE OF TOWN ACCOUNTANT IN THE TOWN OF HULL UNDER THE CIVIL SERVICE LAWS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The office of town accountant in the town of
2 Hull shall, upon the effective date of this act, become subject
3 to the civil service laws and regulations made thereunder, and
4 the tenure of office of the present incumbent thereof shall be
5 unlimited, subject, however, to such laws; provided, that he
6 shall pass a qualifying examination, to which he shall be sub-
7 jected by the division of civil service.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take full effect upon its accept-
2 ance by a majority of the voters of said town voting thereon
3 at an annual town meeting but not otherwise.

To the Honorable Members of the House of Representatives, in and for the State of New York: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your resolution, passed at the session of the Legislature, in relation to the subject of the proposed amendments to the Constitution of this State, and in reply to inform you that the same have been referred to the Committee on the subject, and that they are now engaged in the consideration of the same.

The Constitution of the State

In the Year of the Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Sixty-Six

ARTICLE I. The legislative power of this State shall be vested in a Senate and a House of Representatives, which together shall constitute the Legislature of this State.

SECTION 1. The Senate shall be composed of twenty members, who shall be chosen for the term of two years, and shall be divided into two equal classes, the members of one of which shall be chosen in the first year, the members of the other in the second year, and the members of the first class shall be chosen in the third year.

SECTION 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several counties, and the number of such members shall be equal to the number of counties in this State, but it may be increased or diminished by the Legislature, provided that the number of such members shall not be less than thirty, nor more than fifty.

SECTION 3. This section shall take full effect upon the next election of a majority of the voters of said State, and shall remain in force until an annual vote is taken, but not otherwise.
