## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Fifty-Seven.

### AN ACT TO CORRECT CERTAIN INEQUITIES TO COURT OFFICERS IN ATTENDANCE UPON THE MUNICIPAL COURT OF THE ROXBURY DISTRICT.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in  
General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same,  
as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. The first sentence of section 49 of chapter 35  
2 of the General Laws, as most recently amended by section 2  
3 of chapter 611 of the acts of 1951, is hereby further amended  
4 by inserting after the word "twenty-one", in line 25, the  
5 words: —, court officers in attendance on the municipal  
6 court of the Roxbury district of the city of Boston, — so as  
7 to read as follows: — Every office and position whereof the  
8 salary is wholly payable from the treasury of one or more  
9 counties, or from funds administered by and through county  
10 officials, excluding the offices of county commissioners, the  
11 clerk and the assistant clerks of the superior court for civil  
12 business in the county of Suffolk, the clerk and assistant  
13 clerks of the superior court for criminal business in the county  
14 of Suffolk, clerks and assistant clerks of the courts, the assis-  
15 tant clerk and second assistant clerk of the supreme judi-  
16 cial court for the county of Suffolk, the register of deeds and  
17 assistant registers of deeds for the county of Suffolk, official  
18 stenographers, additional stenographers and temporary steno-  
19 graphers of the superior court in the county of Suffolk, justices

20 and special justices of the district courts, the messenger of  
21 the superior court in the county of Suffolk, the secretary and  
22 assistant secretary of the municipal court of the city of Boston,  
23 clerks and assistant clerks of the district courts other than  
24 the clerks and assistant clerks of district courts in the county  
25 of Suffolk except the municipal court of the city of Boston,  
26 and other than the clerks and assistant clerks of the central  
27 district court of Worcester, and excluding trial justices, other  
28 offices and positions filled by appointment of the governor  
29 with the advice and consent of the council, court officers  
30 appointed in Suffolk county under section seventy of chap-  
31 ter two hundred and twenty-one, court officers in attendance  
32 on the municipal court of the Roxbury district of the city of  
33 Boston, court officers in attendance upon the municipal  
34 court of the city of Boston, court officers in attendance upon  
35 the probate court in the county of Essex, and probation  
36 officers, but including the officer described in the first sen-  
37 tence of section seventy-six of said chapter two hundred and  
38 twenty-one, shall be classified by the board in the manner  
39 provided by sections forty-eight to fifty-six, inclusive, and  
40 every such office and position, now existing or hereafter estab-  
41 lished, shall be allocated by the board to its proper place in  
42 such classification.

1 SECTION 2. Chapter 218 of the General Laws is hereby  
2 amended by inserting after section 82A the following sec-  
3 tion:—

4 *Section 82B.* Each court officer in attendance upon the  
5 municipal court of the Roxbury district of the city of Bos-  
6 ton who is appointed under section sixty-one shall receive  
7 from the county of Suffolk in full for all services performed  
8 by him the following salary:—A minimum salary to start  
9 at four thousand dollars per year and the maximum salary  
10 of fifty-six hundred dollars per year, with the exception of  
11 the chief court officer whose salary shall be six thousand  
12 dollars.

1 SECTION 3. Any person serving as a court officer in the  
2 municipal court of the Roxbury district on the effective

3 date of this act shall receive a salary increase of four hundred  
4 and fifty dollars and on the anniversary date of their ap-  
5 pointment shall receive an increment of two hundred dollars  
6 until such time as he has reached his maximum salary as  
7 provided by section eighty-two B.

8. The eighth part of the report deals with the naval conditions of the country. It is found that the navy is generally well equipped, and the people are generally satisfied with their condition.

9. The ninth part of the report deals with the diplomatic conditions of the country. It is found that the government is generally satisfied with its condition, and the people are generally satisfied with their condition.

10. The tenth part of the report deals with the judicial conditions of the country. It is found that the courts are generally well attended, and the people are generally satisfied with their condition.
