The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Fifty-Seven.

AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR MORE ADEQUATE FACILITIES FOR REGISTRATION OF VOTERS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. In all cities and towns of this commonwealth,
2 the boards of registrars of voters or the election commissioners,
3 as the case may be, shall hold a registration session before the
4 last day for registration for the biennial state election in any
5 factory, mill, hospital, or any public or private institution in
6 their city or town, where permission is granted to hold a
7 registration session, if ten or more voters residing in said
8 city or town shall file with the clerk of said boards or com-
9 missions, not less than forty-eight days before the biennial
10 state election, a petition stating that in such factory, mill or
11 institution in said city or town, there are at least ten citizens
12 who are entitled and desire to be registered.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

The Constitution of Connecticut

As amended by the several Acts of the General Assembly

ARTICLE I. The legislative power shall be vested in the General Assembly, which shall consist of the Senate and House of Representatives. The Senate shall be composed of five members, and the House of Representatives of twenty members, to be chosen by the people for the term of two years. The Senate shall be organized on the first day of January, and the House of Representatives on the first day of September. The General Assembly shall meet on the first day of January, and shall continue to meet until the first day of January following. The General Assembly shall have the sole and exclusive power of originating and passing all bills for raising revenue, and all bills which shall have the effect of increasing or diminishing the salaries of any officer or minister of the State, and all bills which shall have the effect of increasing or diminishing the salaries of any member of the General Assembly. ARTICLE II. The executive power shall be vested in the Governor, who shall be chosen by the people for the term of four years. The Governor shall have the sole and exclusive power of appointing and removing all officers and ministers of the State, and all judges of the courts of the State. The Governor shall also have the sole and exclusive power of pardoning and commuting the punishment of all crimes and offenses against the State.
