

HOUSE No. 426

By Mr. Johnson of Braintree, petition of Carl R. Johnson, Jr., that the town of Weymouth be granted exclusive jurisdiction of police and harbor masters in the portion of Boston Harbor lying within the territorial waters of said town. Harbors and Public Lands.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-One.

AN ACT GRANTING THE TOWN OF WEYMOUTH EXCLUSIVE POLICE AND HARBORMASTERS JURISDICTION OVER ITS TERRITORIAL WATERS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of any general or
2 special law, the town of Weymouth is hereby granted exclusive
3 police and harbor masters jurisdiction in and over that portion
4 of Boston harbor lying within the geographical limits and within
5 the territorial waters of the town of Weymouth.

1 SECTION 2. Nothing in this act shall be construed as abridging
2 the rights of the federal government in the harbor.

The Constitution of Massachusetts

As amended to the 19th of October 1890

1. The Constitution of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts is hereby amended in the following manner:
2. The words "and the right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized;" shall be inserted in Article I, Section 14, of the Constitution.
3. The words "and the right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized;" shall be inserted in Article I, Section 15, of the Constitution.
4. The words "and the right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized;" shall be inserted in Article I, Section 16, of the Constitution.
5. The words "and the right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized;" shall be inserted in Article I, Section 17, of the Constitution.
6. The words "and the right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized;" shall be inserted in Article I, Section 18, of the Constitution.
7.
