

By Mr. Dolan of Ipswich, petition of John F. Dolan for the appointment of a special commission (including members of the General Court) to study and codify rules and regulations of state agencies and to provide for the publication of said rules and regulations. State Administration.

RESOLVE PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF A SPECIAL COMMISSION TO STUDY AND CODIFY ALL RULES AND REGULATIONS MADE BY ALL STATE AGENCIES, BOARDS, COMMISSIONS AND DEPARTMENTS, AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE PUBLICATION OF SAID RULES AND REGULATIONS AS AN APPENDIX TO THE GENERAL LAWS OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

1 *Resolved*, That a special commission of seven qualified persons
2 be appointed, three to be appointed by the governor, one by
3 appointment by the attorney-general, one to be appointed by
4 the secretary of the commonwealth, one to be appointed by the
5 speaker of the house of representatives, and one by appoint-
6 ment by the president of the senate, and is hereby authorized
7 and directed to make a study and codify all rules and regulations
8 made by all state agencies, boards, commissions and depart-
9 ments, and to provide for the publication, upon the completion
10 of said study, of said rules and regulations as an appendix to
11 the general laws of the commonwealth, with the provision of
12 attempting to make such rules and regulations uniform in ap-
13 plication to the provisions of the general laws and the consti-
14 tution of the commonwealth. Said commission may expend
15 such sums as may hereafter be appropriated therefor to carry
16 out the provisions of this resolve. Said commission shall report
17 to the general court the results of its study, and its recommenda-
18 tions, if any, together with drafts of legislation necessary to
19 carry its recommendations into effect, by filing the same with
20 the clerk of the house of representatives on or before the first
21 Wednesday of July in the year nineteen hundred and sixty-two.
