By Mr. Klebanow of Boston, petition of William B. Jackson, Jr., and Benjamin Klebanow for legislation relative to recommendations of wage boards establishing minimum fair wages. Labor and Industries.

AN ACT RELATIVE TO RECOMMENDATIONS OF MINIMUM WAGE BOARDS CONCERNING FAIR WAGES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Section 7 of chapter 151 of the General Laws, as most recently
2 amended, is hereby further amended by striking out the second
3 paragraph of said section 7 and inserting in place thereof the
4 following paragraph: —

5 No wage board, however, can recommend a minimum fair
6 wage below one dollar and fifteen cents per hour, except for
7 learners and apprentices, and except for service people who regu-
8 larly receive gratuities and whose minimum fair rates shall not
9 be below seventy-five cents per hour, and except for janitors
10 and caretakers of residential property, who when furnished with
11 living quarters, shall be paid a wage of not less than thirty-six
12 dollars per week, and except for services as golf caddies.

AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE COMMISSION OF ASSESSMENTS AND TO THE
MANNER OF ASSESSING REAL ESTATE

Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General
Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Section 7 of chapter 122 of the Statutes of this Commonwealth
- 2 amended, in part, by chapter 122 of the Acts of 1902, and the second
- 3 paragraph of said section 7 and section 7 and section 7 of said chapter 122
- 4 following paragraph:—
- 5 The same board, however, and assessment a minimum for
- 6 wages below one dollar and fifteen cents per hour, except for
- 7 persons and operations, and except for service for persons who are
- 8 early workers, and whose minimum fair wages shall not
- 9 be below seven-fifths cents per hour, and except for persons
- 10 and owners of residential property who when furnished with
- 11 living quarters, shall be paid a wage of not less than thirty-
- 12 dollars per week, and except for service as well as for
